

3+3 ACCELERATED DEGREE PROGRAM
BETWEEN
THE STATE UNIVERSITY OF NEW YORK AT COBLESKILL
AND
ALBANY LAW SCHOOL

IT IS PROPOSED THAT the State University of New York at Cobleskill establish with Albany Law School a 3+3 program whereby selected State University of New York at Cobleskill students meeting certain criteria would be automatically eligible to enroll at Albany Law School after their junior year and receive a bachelor's degree from the State University of New York at Cobleskill after successful completion of their first year of study at Albany Law School.

IT IS FURTHER PROPOSED THAT the program be implemented by selecting students from the State University of New York at Cobleskill's Fall freshman class for entry into Albany Law School in the Fall of 2015.

IT IS FURTHER PROPOSED THAT the program become operable within the following guidelines:

1. Program – General:

From each freshman class, students may be admitted to enroll into the program. Selections will occur at two time periods: (1) before the start of the freshman year and (2) immediately after completion of the freshman year. Students admitted into the program will be guaranteed enrollment at Albany Law School after their junior year provided they have satisfied the criteria specified for remaining in the program. After the satisfactory completion of their first year at Albany Law School, students will transfer the credits to the State University of New York at Cobleskill and receive their baccalaureate degree. After successful completion of the remainder of the course of study at Albany Law School, students will receive their law degree.

2. Admission to the Program:

Students for each entering class at Albany Law School will be selected during the spring term preceding initial enrollment in the freshman year. Students may also be selected after completion of the freshman year.

3. Admission Criteria – Before the Freshman Year:

- a. Students desiring to enter the program must be superior prospects in the views of the admission offices of both schools. Normally these students will come from the top tenth of their high school class, have a minimum 88 high school average and will have 1150 Critical Reading and Math SAT or 27 Composite ACT minimum scores.
- b. Students must submit an essay outlining their interest in this program to provide information on motivation and quality of writing.

4. Admission Criteria – After the Freshman Year:

- a. Students must satisfy the same criteria as outlined in 3.a and 3.b.
